CELEBRATING 26TH YEAR OF PROMOTING EXCELLENCE - IN EDUCATION

Twenty Five years is a long time for any NGO. The journey of 25 years entails the story of thousands of people including donors, scholarship recipients in India, children, parents, volunteers and patrons both in the US and India.

It was December 1988 when North South Foundation was born in our basement. It was the brainchild of Dr. N. Bhaskara Rao of New Delhi and I following a long discussion. In 1989, North South Foundation (NSF) was established, and the first scholarship was given in the same year. While the charter of NSF was quite broad, our initial focus was to eliminate money as a barrier for advancement, especially for children with academic excellence in India.

Consistent with this vision, the Foundation began providing college scholarships in India for those who excel among the poor. Starting in 1993, under the leadership of Dr. Murali Gavini, the Foundation began in the US to encourage academic excellence among the children of Indian-American community through educational contests. Starting with spelling bee at first, contests were expanded over time to include vocabulary, math, science, geography, essay writing, public speaking and brain bee. The table below highlights some of the NSF accomplishments, primarily in numerical terms.

North South Foundation is a non-profit organization established in Illinois in 1989. It received tax-exempt status under the IRS Section 501(c)(3).

Our Mission is to promote excellence in human endeavor, to develop human resources and to help people achieve success regardless of religion, gender, caste, geographic origin by giving hope to those who may have none.

The Foundation is all-volunteer driven with less than 5 percent overhead. While organizing events, we strive to get discounts from our vendors and sponsorships for our awards. These measures keep our expenses down and channel donated funds more towards helping the needy.

The Scholarship program in India is designed to encourage excellence among the poor. It is targeted at qualified, needy students entering college. Over 12,000 scholarships have been awarded to date. The Foundation has given over 2,500 scholarships the past academic year. Each scholarship is \$250 per student per year. Awards are made following strict selection criteria based on merit and need. Students are selected from 26 centers spread across India. These centers are run by dedicated volunteers who are committed to the noble cause of helping the poor who excel in studies to attend college. There is a plan to add more chapters, especially in states where NSF does not have a presence. Please contact us if you can help us start a new chapter.

Educational contests in the US are designed to encourage academic excellence among Indian American children. The spelling, vocabulary, math, science, geography, essay writing, and public speaking bees are conducted annually in two steps. Children initially participate in any of 85 centers in the US. Winners of these contests are invited for the national finals. National top three rankers are awarded scholarships ranging from \$1,000 to \$250, redeemable in the winners' freshman year of college. Brain bee is conducted only at the national level. More than 120,000 contestants benefited from NSF bees. Please contact us if you would like to have a chapter in your area. NSF offers online coaching in pre-mathcounts, mathcounts, SAT, Geography and Universal Values. More than 2,700 children have enrolled this year. Online coaching is made possible through the dedication of 250 volunteer coaches with a passion to make a difference.

Accomplishments of NSF Children: Many NSF children have scored top ranks in the Scripps National Spelling Bee, National Geographic Bee, MATHCOUNTS and Science Bowls. Top colleges in the US have accepted numerous NSF children. More importantly, these contests help children improve their communication skills, self-confidence and empower them to become better citizens for tomorrow.

Role Model Award: The Foundation has awarded its inaugural Role Model Award, 'Vishwa Jyothi' to Rajiv Vinnakota in 2003, Nipun Mehta in 2004 and Nimesh Patel in 2014. It helps to showcase human values and academic excellence to the children of Indian American community.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2014

Notable accomplishments during the year 2014 are given below:

- NSF started Geography online coaching program with 500 children and 28 volunteer coaches. This is quite remarkable given this is the first year and Geography is not a subject in schools.
- NSF had 5 new chapter openings during 2014, now totaling 86 chapters in the US.
- NSF kids won five academic super bowls in 2014 (Scripps National Spelling Bee, National Geographic Bee, MATHCOUNTS, National Science Bowl and National History Bee).
- Sreeram Hathwar captured the 2014 Scripps spelling bee Co-championship in Washington,
 D.C. This is the seventh year in a row that an NSF child has won the Scripps spelling bee
 championship. Sreeram won a scholarship of over \$40,000, with Gokul Venkatachalam,
 (3rd place), Ashwin Veeramani (4th place), and Neha Konakalla and Tejas Muthusamy
 (joint 8th place) as the top 10 finalists at Scripps.
- Akhil Rekulapally won the National Geographic Bee championship with Ameya Mujumdar
 as the runner-up. This is the second year in a row that an NSF child has won the National
 Geographic bee championship. Pranit Nanda, Krish Patel, and Asha Jain, were among the
 top 10 finalists in the geography bee.
- Swapnil Garg became the champion of 2014 MATHCOUNTS with Akshaj Kadaveru, Rajiv Movva and Srivats Narayanan among the top 12-40 positions in the MATHCOUNTS.
- Abhijeet Sambangi and Snigdha Allaparti were members of the champion team at the Science Bowl.
- Siddharth Kamannavar became the first NSF child to win the National History Bee.
- The last several years have seen tremendous growth for the academic contests held by NSF among 86 regional centers. We're thrilled to report that around 18,000 contestants registered in various categories this year. Of these, Ashburn, VA had the highest registration count at 699, followed very closely by Dallas, TX (698), Atlanta, GA (644), Seattle, WA (622), Princeton, NJ (556), Raleigh, NC (554), Palo Alto, CA (535), Manchester, NH (514) and Detroit, MI (508). For the first time, Math Bee Level 2 registrations (2,953) exceeded that of the Junior Spelling Bee, which had 2,377 contestants nationwide. The Math Bee contest combining all three levels attracted a record 6,248 contestants in 2014. We are indebted to all the new and existing regional coordinators and volunteers who worked hard to make the regional contests successful.
- MATHCOUNTS and PRE-MATHCOUNTS coaching classes were received again with overwhelming response and thanks to the great effort by the teachers and their leadership team. There were over 100 classes comprising 1,247 students.
- NSF started SAT online coaching, both in English and Math in 2012. Number of children taking SAT reached 647 with 75 volunteers agreeing to coach. Some coaches were handling multiple classes. NSF is grateful for their tremendous contribution.
- NSF also started Universal Value classes in 2013 with number of children reaching 360.
- The 2014 NSF National Championship Finals were conducted at the University of Texas at Dallas, Richardson, TX, during August 16-17 with an attendance of 1400 contestants.
- Many Regional centers held workshops in Spelling, Vocabulary, Geography, Math, and Science during 2014. The Bee Workshops are designed to encourage and prepare children to take part in NSF and other similar contests.
- NSF started recognizing individuals and organizations for their continued volunteer and
 financial support since 2012. NSF has instituted several levels of donor awards such as
 Distinguished Donor Award given to Dr. Ravindranath Khambampati, Life Time Donor
 Award given to Ashok K. Ray, late Venugopal Keshavulu, and Ashok Kache, and Honorable
 Donor Awards given to Bosebabu Mandava, Deepak Vashisht, and Dr. Sarode Pundaleeka
 in 2012. NSF has also instituted several volunteer awards such as the Founder's Award
 which has been given to Dr. Murali Gavini (the person behind the NSF spelling bee contests.

Starting from 1993) in 2012, to Dr. Krishnaiah Revuluri (the person behind the NSF math contests) in 2013, and to Mrs. Sumana Sur (the person behind NSF Geography bee) in 2014. Other volunteer awards given to several dedicated people include the *Lifetime Achievement Award and the Distinguished Service Award*.

 NSF recognizes Indian-American youth who inspire our children by their willingness to break new ground and surmount all obstacles with the Viswa Jyothi Role Model Award;
 2014 award goes to Mr. Nimesh Patel of Empty Hands Music Pilgrimage.

Volunteers: The Foundation is looking for volunteers in many areas of its endeavors. The success of any public foundation depends on its volunteers. It is the collective efforts of volunteers that made this Foundation what it is today. Volunteerism is like an elastic band. Educational Contests in the US: The expenses for conducting the contests are covered by registration fees and local collections. The scholarships for the National Champions are covered by contributions from individuals, non-profit organizations, and excess funds remaining from the registration fees.

India Activities: During 2014 scholarship season, we expanded our effort from 18 India chapters to 26; more than 2,500 scholarships were awarded. For the 2014-15 academic year, the target is 3,000. NSF website (www.northsouth.org) was updated to make it easy for potential applicants, volunteers and donors to access information about our India scholarship program. 24TH NSF Walk-A-Thon RAISES \$5000!

The North South Foundation Walk-A-Thon and 25th Anniversary Celebrations were held on October 5, 2014 at Blackwell Forest Preserve, South Shelter in Warrenville, IL. The event started at around 11:00 a.m. and ended around 4:00 p.m. Over 60 people, including parents and children participated to support the noble cause. All participants were served with lunch, which was arranged by Mrs. Chitturi, sponsored by Viceroy of India Restaurant. In addition to regular walking and jogging, Mrs. Sandhya Kamath, one of the organizers of this event had arranged some exciting games for children as well as parents. One of the games called 'Scavenger Hunt', involved both parents and children working together by collecting materials specified in the clues. Mrs. Sandhya had also prepared the crossword puzzles that involved identifying words describing 25 years of NSF's accomplishments. Both parents and children enjoyed identifying all the words in the clue. Winners were given surprise rewards. At the event, Mr. Velusubramanium, the Hindsdale Chapter Coordinator, had prepared a chart which described the history of NSF and how it has been growing in terms of conducting contests in the Umited States and providing scholarships in India. Overall, it was a very successful event.

THE SCHOLARSHIP PROCESS

North South Foundation (NSF) provides scholarships to undergraduate students entering into engineering, medicine or 3-year polytechnic (diploma in engineering) based on merit and financial need. The scholarship process begins at the chapter level in India with an announcement. Each India chapter has a volunteer who acts as the India Chapter Coordinator (ICC) who is responsible for all activities of the chapter – from forming the selection committee, reviewing applications, interviewing applicants and giving the scholarship checks at an awards ceremony. Volunteers who live in USA and are closely associated with a chapter in India act as liaisons. Liaisons in US interact with the ICCs and are involved with the chapter in many ways – from actually starting the chapter by identifying a volunteer in India, to figuring out ways to spread the word, to meeting candidates while visiting India and more. The liaison also facilitates meetings between a scholar and an interested donor. Please refer to the section in the review which lists contact information of Liaisons and India Chapter Coordinators.

10 STEPS TO HOW "YOUR \$ HELPS EDUCATE"

- 1. India Chapter announces scholarships through local media and in schools (April-June)
- 2. Students send in their details and request for an application (June-Aug).
- India Chapter Coordinator screens requests and sends applications to eligible candidates (June-Aug).
- 4. Applications are completed and mailed by students. Income certificates and mark sheets are part of the application (June-Aug).
- India Chapter Coordinator (ICC) forms a selection panel, reviews applications and shortlists candidates to interview (Sept).
- 6. ICC and selection panel interview candidates. One parent is expected to accompany the student. Bus or train fare is reimbursed to the student (Sept-Oct).
- 7. ICC sends recommendations to NSF India Coordinator in Hyderabad (Oct-Nov).
- 8. NSF India Coordinator and US scholarships team do final review. Sometimes further clarifications are requested before approval (Oct-Nov).
- 9. The Chapter also processes any renewals at this time since NSF supports the student through the entire course of study (Aug-Oct).
- India Chapter holds an award ceremony and honors NSF scholarship recipients (Dec-Jan).

SCHOLARSHIPS IN INDIA - ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

North South Foundation (NSF) provides scholarships to undergraduate students entering into engineering, medicine or 3-year polytechnic (diploma in engineering.) based on merit and financial need. NSF uses uniform eligibility criteria to identify poor but meritorious students across chapters.

Eligibility criteria for NSF college scholarships are listed below:

- Marks in the top 10 percentile of 10th or 12th or CET/JET in the state
- Annual family income must be less than Rs 65,000 p.a.
- Preference to students coming from government schools and colleges.
- Preference to fresh students going to government colleges.
- Preference to students not getting other scholarships.
- NSF gives scholarships after evaluating the need.
- Scholarship is limited to Rs. 15,000 for degree and Rs. 5000 for Diploma students.

2013-14 NSF COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS REPORT

Every time a child participates in a North South Foundation (NSF) educational bee, workshop, or even an online course, another child in India benefits. What started off as one scholarship in 1989 has reached 2549 scholarships in 2014 – and that number is still growing. Over the past twenty-five years, NSF has provided more than 12,000 scholarships and helped students receive the higher education that they deserve.

DAS is for the children by the children. The Pledge Sheet is very simple. It has 100 squares and each square is worth a dollar. By going around the neighborhood and asking family friends and classmates parents, children can easily fill in the squares. Children can ask for as little as a dollar. Usually donors come up with at least \$5, if they explain the cause. Bee participants can gain free access to NSF's on-line games when they complete 100 squares.

WHY I WANT TO SERVE NSF

With the sole objective of promoting 'Excellence in Education', North South Foundation (NSF) has been working hard to uplift bright and poor students, particularly from rural areas in India. This is what motivated me to get involved in NSF activities. I readily agreed to join as coordinator of Madurai Chapter so I fulfill my own purpose of life. Moreover, this provides me with an opportunity to work and interact with the youth which, in my opinion, helps in the development my own inner self.

When started in 2002-03, Madurai was part of Chennai Chapter run under BREAD (Basic Research, Education and Development Society, a sister concern of NSF) program. With NSF USA taking charge of the Indian operations directly from 2004-05, the Madurai chapter also got formally established with me as the coordinator. The Chapter has another dedicated volunteer, N. Nagarajan, working along with me. The team works in unison and with devotion with the motto of "Service above Self". The chapter has steady growth to its credit. The number of fresh NSF scholars selected has grown from 6 in 2002-03 to 105 in 2013-14. The total number of scholarships given out over the years is 246.

Initially we depended only on the announcements issued in local newspapers for receiving applications. Over a period of time, we developed more potent channels. We have now regular contacts with like-minded NGOs. Further, we are fortunate to have our current and past scholars of NSF to propagate the mission through word of mouth with good effect. Because of my association with many schools around, we are able to disseminate information about NSF by announcing in various school events and also by maintaining regular interaction with Headmasters/ Principals.

During interviews for selection of candidates, effective and detailed screening methods are used in order to decide the deservedness of the students by assessing the economic status of the family and also the commitment of the student. In this connection, I like to bring in my past work experience to do justice to the students and the organization to the best of my ability.

At Madurai chapter, we also make conscious efforts to be in touch with the scholars in and around Madurai so we will be able to arrange meetings and also conduct special classes for personality development. Local dignitaries are invited to grace events where awards are given to the students.

In sum, the Madurai Chapter has done its best to spread the ideals of NSF among NGOs, educational institutions, and among the student community. The students have been responding well and the future certainly looks bright with many of them keen to do similar service in their lives in times to come.

As NSF Coordinator for more than a decade, I have benefited immensely through interaction with the younger generation and their motivation. I could see the impact of the NSF support on the students who have come from economically disadvantaged backgrounds and thanks to NSF, they could elevate their families above poverty line. To be a member of NSF team in their massive exercise to identify the deserving bright and poor students and develop them to be fit for productive jobs, makes me humble and honored. MY ASSOCIATION WITH NSF

I come from a poor family. During my primary school days, I used to walk about 8 km from my home to the school. When the headmaster found my condition and when he realized that I used to study well by working hard in spite of adverse conditions, he asked me to stay with his family in his house and study. He offered free coaching over and above free dining along with his family members. His objective was to ensure that I get good scholarship and at the same time school can get good name. His efforts and his encouragement resulted in my getting the scholarship not only in primary school, but also in middle and high schools. I can say with pride that I could complete Intermediate Science (equivalent to 12th grade) successfully with the scholarship money provided to me. I completed Engineering with stipend, and ultimately became an Engineer in Irrigation department of Govt. of Odisha. It all happened due to the selfless work and encouragement of my primary school teacher.

As an engineer, I proudly served the nation. My teacher's example is the primary source of inspiration for me to help the poor & meritorious students for their higher education. In 2001 when I visited USA, I came in contact with Sri S. K. Das Verma who worked earlier with me in Balimala Project, Odisha. He introduced me to North South Foundation (NSF) and its activities. In 2004, I contacted S.C. Choudhry, Chairman of Vikash Educational Charitable Trust who informed me further details of NSF. From that time on, I have been working with North South Foundation. In memory of my primary school teacher, I will work till my last breath through NSF and other similar organizations to help the poor and meritorious students.

While talking about NSF, I am reminded of an act of generosity of Dr. Chitturi when he visited Odisha in 2009. He was very kind to include some of the applicants for scholarship who were not considered by us. It shows largess of his heart. He also spared time to distribute the checks to the meritorious diploma students of Bhubananda Orissa School of Engineering (BOSE), the oldest technical institution of Odisha at Cuttack. We started giving scholarships to three students in 2004 and are now able to provide scholarships to 600 students in 2014. It could only be possible because of the bigheartedness of the organizers like Dr. Ratnam Chitturi, Rao Chalasani, C.M. Rao, Ch. Hanumantha Rao and many others of NSF in USA and in India.

When Vikash initiated the Complementary Education Initiative Program in 2009-10 to enlarge its support to include even the social sciences & humanities students preparing for the Civil Service Examination, NSF did not hesitate and came forward to support it.

Our process of identifying the eligible scholars is simple. Every year, we communicate to about forty Government technical institutions by providing the eligibility criteria specified by NSF to allow the students to apply online. We also remind them from time to time about the scholarships over telephone. The students download documents and send the filled forms through their respective Principals to us for checking and submitting to NSF office at Hyderabad. Our office staff ensures timely submission of the applications. We distribute the checks to students in the presence of their respective college principals, Dean, professors, and lecturers.

NSF and its Chapter Coordinators work as a family. I am very happy to be involved in the NSF family.

Bharath Ram, a high school senior at Health Careers High School in San Antonio has been a part of North South Foundation for the last 11 years, initially as a participant and, more recently, as a volunteer. Also thanks to my dad for doing the negotiations with the school authorities. But, it did not take much to impress them as the kids devoured every bit of the coaching. After the workshop, my daughter recalls being called out in a crowded local market by one of the students. She can never forget this. For me, it was not just another workshop, as the whole experience gave a real perspective for my daughter on how the economically backward children are eager to learn - sit on the floor as there were no chairs or tables in the class room and make do with what they have.

That was the beginning of an idea to help many more NSF alumni to organize similar workshops in India. APNA – Ambassador Program for NSF Alumni was born, soon after that. With so much expertise in educational contests, tools to excel in academics, and a large volunteer base, there is a huge scope for making a real impact in the lives of thousands of deserving children in India, to excel in academics. THE IMPORTANCE OF LITERACY IN ASIAN INDIAN STUDENTS

North South Foundation has been doing yeomen service toward education by offering children opportunities to excel in academic skills. NSF conducts Vocabulary, Spelling, Public Speaking, and Essay Writing bee along with the Math, Science, and Geography Bee contests. With an active profession as a language teacher and a postdoctoral researcher on literacy related issues, I am always interested in children's language acquisition and eventual mastery. The NSF contests challenge and motivate children of Indian origin to think of reading and writing and not just science related topics. Though significant amounts of money is spent for Science Fairs and Math Bowls, there appears that not much funding is available for literacy events. I can only think of one example of encouraging such language related competitions is the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE), which conducts essay-writing contests to high school juniors.

I am happy that NSF provides students of Indian origin opportunities to express their talent so these students may explore culturally relevant topics, especially while writing their essays. Language acquisition is crucial at a young age because children must learn to communicate through writing and speaking in the future if they want to be successful in their chosen careers. Hence, spelling, vocabulary, public speaking, and writing must be learned through consistent and constant practice and NSF contests motivate children to excel in these areas of language development.

Spelling: Spelling is an important skill that students need in order to present their writing well. The following words used in the national spelling bee may not be familiar to some students unless they are interested in humanities - Aeschylean, gemeinschaft, and encaenia. Aeschylean is something relating to Aeschylus, the Greek dramatist. Gemeinschaft, borrowed from Sociology is a term used by Ferinand Tonnies to describe close-knit communities, often found in rural areas, in which strong personal bonds with members exist. Gemeinschaft was one of primary themes that emerged in data in my PhD dissertation. Encaenia is a festival, a dedication, or a commemoration. Children learn such beautiful words to signify a person or a cultural event through practicing for the NSF contests.

Vocabulary: This contest encourages and facilitates vocabulary building in children. Lexicon is important to build word bank and this skills is powerful for speakers. Children who wish to pursue the medical field have to master words and their etymology. Vocabulary building also helps with idiolect in children because we all have our own stylized way of presenting materials both orally and using script to people and in academe.

Public Speaking: Presenting in front of many people can be daunting to some children because of stage fright or fear of exposure. Some of my international university students are terrified when asked to present lessons to the class. Therefore public speaking must be taught to children from childhood. This skill requires a good command over the language and an appealing and consolidated way to present information.

Essay Writing: This is an art and it comes from practice. Children have a skill to learn languages, however, they must be taught to write. The essay-writing contest enables children to acquire writing mechanics along with learning to present their argument in writing.

I have graded the regional NSF essays for the San Antonio area and I am pleased with the choice of topics that were offered to students. It is organizations such as NSF that create a platform for spellers, speakers, and writers to excel in different contests so they can feel good about their language skills along with making their parents, teachers, and the community proud. Congratulations on the silver anniversary and I wish many more years of serving!

NSF UNIVERSAL VALUES PROGRAM

T here have been several inquiries from parents about the Universal Values program. Some parents also wanted to know what competition this program prepares one for – like spelling bee or Mathcounts. Therefore it would be best to answer the question; what the universal values program is all about?

Just like roots are important for a tree to flourish and bear nourishing fruits so are values to a society. A society without values will degenerate. The mission of the Universal Values program has been to provide a platform for children to come together to discuss universal values and practice them so that they become an integral part of their daily lives. It also endeavors to help children excel in values in addition to excelling in academic subjects. In doing so, engage volunteers and parents to practice Universal Values.

Universal Values online workshop commenced for the first time in fall of 2013. NSF Universal Values online workshop classes are conducted by trained coaches once a week for an hour for 30 weeks. For the first year we selected 15 values to cover. One new value was introduced every two weeks. Children are introduced to the value in class; the coach explains the value, talks about the benefits of following the value, consequence of not following the value and opens the discussion on how to practice the value and what challenges one might face when following the value. Children are fully engaged in discussions, they are encouraged to openly share their thoughts and experiences in practicing these values. Outside the workshop, children are encouraged to apply the values in their daily life until the values become part of them.

The classes are conducted online, through the Wiziq tool. The students are required to download the study material and come prepared for the classes. The material is then uploaded on the screen for the students to discuss and share their experiences and viewpoints. They are also required to practice the values as homework and share their experiences in the following class. They could share their experiences in the form of poems, art works, write-ups and stories. Three levels are offered, Junior: 1 to 3 grades, Intermediate: 4 to 8 grades, Senior: 9 to 12 grades.

We had an overwhelming response with more than 360 children participating in the program. There were 35 coaches conducting 18 classes each week. The coaches are offered weekly training, and the children's participation during the weekly sessions is fantastic and encouraging. They began to apply the value in their daily life and share their personal experiences. Coaches and parents also practice the values in their personal life.

Practicing the values in order to imbibe them is a lifelong process, keeping that in mind this year NSF offers Universal Values -101 for new students and Universal Values -201 for returning students. Based on the parents' feedback we have made some changes to the program, it now offers 10 values covered in 20 weeks and also uses WebEx for better online service.

Here's a write up of a child on how she practiced the value <u>Respond after thinking thoughtfully</u>: "If you won't respond after thinking thoughtfully people won't talk to you. One time I was about to say "You're not supposed to do that." in a mean way to my friend Ava. But then I stopped and thought for a minute "Is that the right way to talk to her? "No was my answer. So I went up to her and said in a kind way that she wasn't supposed to do that."

It is Dr. Ratnam Chitturi's firm belief that one needs to have strong values over and above academic excellence to be truly successful in life. We at NSF share this belief and are committed to inspiring our students to practice the values until it becomes their very nature.

GEOGRAPHY COACHING

- By NSF Geo Coaching Team

The National Geography Bee is open to schools with students in grades four through eight. Geography covers many aspects like physical geography, political geography, economical geography, historic geography to name a few. Given that schools cover very little of this in the regular curriculum, NSF started online Geography coaching to offer a more comprehensive curriculum. We modeled the strategy on the one used by the Tampa Geo Bee Group for the last 4 years.

NSF decided to conduct 10 sessions, with each session lasting for 2 hours. In order to give a head start to students preparing for the National Geography Bee right from Kindergarten, we offer two levels of coaching. Junior Geography Bee (JGB) coaching is for K through 3rd grade and Senior Geography Bee (SGB) coaching is catered for children in 4th through 8th grade. WebEx was used to conduct these online classes.

Before opening up the registration, applications from interested NSF parents were invited to volunteer/serve as coaches. The curriculum was set by Tampa GeoBee chief coach. Three 'Train the trainers' were conducted by Tampa GeoBee coaches to prepare the volunteers through WebEx session. Four mentors were assigned to help the NSF coaches to prepare the material and answer their questions.

Though it was just the first year of this coaching, the program attracted 508 registrations and 30 NSF coaches. Due to the overwhelming response, all the coaches reached the maximum capacity.

In the first session, coaches connect with the students by sending the welcome letter/calendar and curriculum. Current Events, Countries/Continents and Quiz are the three areas covered in each subsequent 2 hour session. Students are assigned the homework of collecting 20 new facts for each week.

NSF hopes to continue to instill the thirst of knowledge in these students through these online coaching sessions and lead them to success in life.

We at NSF are very happy to announce the continues success of the SAT program for the consecutive three years. With the emerging need and the importance of the SAT tests in college admissions, we felt it was an apt time to start this program. The vision of several people at NSF for SAT has become a reality today. It is indeed a team effort that has bought us thus far. Over 1200 parents are members for this program currently and the number keeps growing. We have about 1000 students registered for the program this year. Words cannot express the joy that the NSF SAT family has experienced with the huge response for the program. With about 100 coaches /sessions and several team members working hard round the clock, we are confident the program will be a huge success.

A bit of introduction about the SAT. SAT is a standardized test for college admissions in the United States. It is an acronym for Scholastic aptitude test or Scholastic assessment test, but more generally now known as SAT. It is a benchmark to assess students in the areas of critical reading, mathematical reasoning and writing skills. It is one of the most recognized test scores for college admission process and an entry ticket to the various institutions in the US. It is administered by the College Board.

The NSF SAT program is an online coaching program with an objective to augment NSF students in getting admitted to the top universities. The students will be coached for strategies, techniques and guided with various suit of tools and intense training to take the SAT test. There is extensive coaching provided for all the three sections of SAT, namely critical reading, writing and mathematics. Better outcomes are guaranteed if they follow the program with due diligence and practice. It is an entirely online program that uses WebEx, an Internet based classroom tool, for the sessions. All you need is a computer with a high speed Internet connection along with audio for voice. The program is mainly geared towards students in 7th grade and above. It is a 16 week program that usually starts in Oct and goes till end of January. The program has two levels based on grade: Senior for grade 10, 11 and 12; Junior for grades 7, 8 and 9. These levels are offered in both SAT English & SAT Math. These classes run for 1.5 hours for each subject. So eah student gets a total of 48 hours of instruction in the course. All of this quality education at a very nominal cost of 250 dollars! We plan to have this program on an ongoing basis. Please pass this information on to anyone that you think might be interested. Growing up in a typical middle class family in the northern suburbs of Bangalore, I did what was expected of me. Study hard, get good grades, learn Carnatic music & Bharatanatyam, play sports, and do chores. When it was time to choose the path for college, I was expected to choose between medicine and engineering. BSc, BA, LLB were not popular choices then and were discouraged too! Given that I could not stand the sight of a needle or blood, medicine was not an option! My love for math and computer programming made my choice to become a software engineer, an easy one. Today, kids have the opportunity to study and work in any field of their choice, not just a doctor or an engineer!

The world we grew up in revolved around our neighborhood, our families, and our education. It was an accepted fact that the children of our maids, the coolies, constructions workers and farmers, would just follow in their parents' footsteps. These children would drop out of elementary schools to help either in the farms, or do jobs to earn money so they would have food to eat. We accepted this inequality as we did not know any better! Giving the poor families extra food, clothing or money was the extent of our generosity. Don't get me wrong, we were not rich by any means, and we were kind and helpful to everybody. In fact my dad comes from a farmer family in a small village outside Bangalore, and he is the only one in his family who studied beyond the third grade. Today, he holds an Electrical engineering degree! But there was an obvious line of distinction between the middle class and the poor families and nothing was done to erase that line.

Fast forward a few years. With a Masters in Computer Science, a good job and marriage, Rajiv and I became proud parents of two boys, Rohit & Suraj. We settled in the suburbs of Boston. They say your life changes when you have kids. Very true! As parents we look to raise our kids in an environment that is safe, nurturing and rich in culture. We want to give them the best opportunities in life. We teach them right from wrong, tolerance, love and compassion.

It was while seeking opportunities for my older son Rohit, to participate in, that a friend told me about NSF and the Spelling bee competition in Massachusetts. He was in Kindergarten and I signed him up! I looked at the 1000 word list and realized how overwhelming it is for a five year old to prepare. I decided that our goal should be to let him learn as many words as he can. If it was a hundred words, then he would know to spell 100 more words than he did prior to preparation for the contest! It was not about winning the contest, but about learning. Several parents I talk to say they don't want to sign their kids up for contests because they don't think the kids can win. What they don't see is the missed opportunity for the kids to learn something! When parents think this way, it is the child that loses out.

At the awards ceremony on the day of the contest, I learned about the organization and their mission. I was truly amazed! Dr. Ratnam Chitturi started this organization with the intent to change the lives of the kids and their families in India, the very people growing up we did not give a chance for a change! Giving the gift of a higher education enables the kids to earn a degree and improve the quality of life for themselves and their families!

That day I understood what it meant to give back to the community, and the impact we can make in the lives of many kids! Watching the scholarship recipients speak about how thankful they were for the opportunity NSF

gave them to attend college that allowed them to secure good jobs, and provide for their families, who just a few years ago were living in poverty, moved me to tears!

This is the kind of world we should raise our children in. Understanding the privileges they have, and not take them for granted. Learning to be compassionate, and the importance of helping other kids who are not so fortunate and realizing that no matter how young you are, you can make a difference in the world!

I began volunteering for NSF, by helping out on contest days. Each year I got more involved and took on more responsibilities. It was easy because I believed in the mission of the organization. Being involved with NSF for over a decade now, it has been the most rewarding and enriching experience for me and my family! On the one hand, my kids benefitted from participating in the contests. On the other hand, they also learned where the contest fee was going to, and how it changed the lives of the kids in India! My children have been participating in the various bees since they were five years old. They have gained an amazing wealth of knowledge just by preparing for the contests. Learning about the world we live in, the inventions in science and technology, or solving higher level math problems, prepares them to not only be competitive, but also well-rounded individuals.

A \$250 scholarship will allow one kid to attend college for one year. Doesn't it cost about that much to buy an iPod Touch or an Xbox or other electronic devices that we seem to buy our kids these days? Think about it the next time you are at a store with your kids. Talk to them about the value of money and the difference it can make in their lives and the lives of their counterparts in India. Encourage them to think about this and do their part to make a difference.

I am so proud to be a part of the NSF family, a group of dedicated volunteers who sacrifice family time to help carry out the mission of the organization. My parents have also been a great influence on me. They donated land so the first college could be built in their village. Each year they adopt a handful of schools in nearby villages and distribute books, uniforms, and sponsor cash prizes for kids who perform well. They also donate plates and glasses for the kids to eat their free mid-day meal in school (the only meal of the day for many), in lieu of a leaf they used before. I look up to my parents and admire their dedication to give back to their community. Winston Churchill once said: "You make a living by what you get. You make a life by what you give". Through NSF, I hope to continue dedicate my time and energy and do my best to give back to our community, with the belief that my kids will follow too! Today thanks to NSF, my life is richer, more meaningful & fulfilling.

NSF is not just about spelling bee and geography bee, winning the regionals or the nationals. It is also about giving the gift of education to the less fortunate. It is about volunteerism, and doing our part to make this world a better place. It is about raising our children to understand that every child deserve an opportunity to succeed. It is about teaching them to care about their environment and their communities. It is about understanding that they are the citizens of the world, and should do their part to make the world a better place, a place that they will be proud to call their own!


Senior Brain Bee Winners

"Where is he?" The pronouncer looked slightly confused because he could not see Samir. After 30 rounds, Samir (seven years old) was sitting on his haunches, off stage. I could see the exhaustion in his face and body, but he stood up and spelled his word. I was so proud of him, but above all I was grateful to North South Foundation for making it possible for my son to compete at such a young age. Here was an organization that did not dictate at which age a child could or should compete.

On the contrary, North South Foundation understood the value of encouraging young students to start early, develop a strong work ethic, and set high goals. That day, whether Samir realized it or not, he learned a valuable lesson in perseverance, doing one's best, and holding oneself to a high standard.
